## GOLD CUP BOAT RACES.

Several New York Craft to Compete at Lake George.

Beginning on Wednesday and con-

tinuing through the following two days, the annual motorboat races for the Gold Challenge Cup of the American Power Boat Association will be held on a thirty nautical mile course around Dome Island on Lake George. It is the most important motorboat event of the year, in America. Eleven of the fastest boats in this part of the country will start. Additional enthusiasm attends this year's races owing to the fact that this is the first time in ten years the Gold Cup race has been held anywhere except on the St. Lawrence. Yacht Club Islands The Thousand held the gold goblet for nine consecutive races and the entrants usually repre-

sented the various clubs on the St. Lawrence, although the event was always open to any boat in the United States and Canada. Last year Count Casimir S. Mankowski, in his 300 horse power mahogany racer Ankle Deep, simply walked away with all three races. The racers this year are a much more powerful lot than in any previous race for the 12-inch gold cup. Every challenging boat, with one exception, has been built this year especially for this

race.

An accurate thirty-nautical-mile course was marked out last Winter on the ice. The start and finish line is directly off the ruins of the Sagamore Hotel Green Island. This makes an almost perfect course for the high-powered, delicately built racing shells. There is no current to steer against, no tide lo combat speed, and, most important of all, no driftwood to reduce the thin

mahogany bottoms to splinters. wind, which raises a disagreeable chop all day, usually dies down around 4:30 o'clock in the afternoon, when the races will start. Consequently it is the opinion of every one connected with motorboat racing that the long-awaited sixtymile-an-hour speed will be attained. There is more than a possibility that the trophy will go to New York City. Four boats hailing from this port are entered, and on paper they are the equal of anything in the race. Commodore J. Stuart Blackton of the Atlantic Yacht

Club, Brooklyn, has built two new boats for the race. They are Baby Reliance

V., which he will drive himself, and Speed Demon II., entered in the name of his wife, Mrs. Paula H. Blackton, who is a member of the Motor Boat Club of America. The clubs along Riverside Drive will be represented by James Simpson of the Columbia Yacht Club, in his new Crouch-designed Peter VI., and Wilbur H. Young of the Colonial Yacht Club will drive speedster Harpoon. William J. Connors, known to politics "Fingy" Connors, has been elected Commodore of the Buffalo Yacht Club. Under that club's flag he will race his boat, Buffalo Equirer. Tech, Jr., entered by Gen. T. Coleman du Pont, representing the Corinthian Yacht Club of Philadelphia; is the same boat which was erroneously accredited with a fiftyeight-mile-an-hour record two years ago
